Len Staab Awarded the Order of the Transit

At this past summer's Leadership School in Chicago, Brother Len Staab, Chapter Eternal, was awarded the newest Triangle National award, the Order of the Transit. According to the national organization, the Order of the Transit is described as follows:

The Order of the Transit is conferred for pre-eminent work in developing a Triangle chapter or association. The criterion is that of molding the character of the group and its members, and not that of finance or numerical expansion. The member's service must have been clearly outstanding, not merely long-lasting, and must have

had a positive effect on individual members and on the chapter or association as a whole. The Order of the Transit was created by the National Council in 1997 to serve as a counterpart for the Triangle Service Key and is the highest national award given for local service.

Coming to America

For many of us, going away to college was a big step. How far away did you come from to attend Marquette? Was it 20 minutes? 2 hours? How about 20 hours? That's exactly what Amit Mehta did when he decided to attend Marquette, leaving his home in Nairobi, Kenya. Amit joined Marquette Triangle during the spring 1998 semester with pledge brothers Ron Tiangco and William Hansen.

Jason: What was school like in Kenya, and how did it prepare you for college in the United States?

Amit: Schooling in Kenya is based on the British schooling system. I took a system of courses called the "International Baccalaureate" which prepares students to attend universities in other countries. It allowed me to come to Marquette with 30 credits.

Jason: What were your first impressions of the United States?

Amit: The first thing that I noticed is that people were driving on the wrong side of the road. I also noticed that everything was larger. The roads were larger and the buildings were larger.

Jason: Why did you choose Marquette?

Amit: Marquette offered more scholarships to international students. There weren't very many other universities in the United States that offered financial assistance like Marquette did.

Jason: How about your first impressions of campus?

Amit: When I arrived at Marquette, I was somewhat confused. I thought that the campus was going to be a closed campus, and there was going to be more greenery, like there was in Kenya. It looked a lot different in the brochures.

Jason: What did you know about fraternities before you came to the U.S.?

Amit: I had only heard the word "fraternity" before. That was all I really knew.

Jason: How did you first learn about Triangle?

Amit: My first experience with Triangle was in my general engineering class during the first semester of my freshman year. Dan Merz (1996-1997 president) was speaking to the class, and I was very impressed by what he said. He talked about brotherhood, and all of the brothers just having fun.

Jason: What made you want to join?

Amit: After hearing Dan talk about Triangle, I really put it in the back of my mind. I didn't attend any rush events that semester, but during the second semester I put my name on one of the information sheets for the chapter. When Ryan Murphy called me up, he said a couple things that really stuck in my mind. He first told me that there was absolutely no pressure to join. He also told me that the pledge process is a two-way street, brothers get a chance to meet prospectives, and prospectives and can find out if the place is right for them. That really caught my attention, and I came by the house after that.

Jason: What are some of your most memorable experiences at Marquette Triangle so far?

Amit: When I returned from Christmas break, I found my car in a pile of snow. (While Amit was gone, a number of actives turned his car into a massive snow pile.) I had only ever seen snow once before, when I visited the United States in 1990. Another memory is my "Worf" nickname. (Amit bears a striking resemblance to the Worf character in the new Star Trek series.) I didn't know what people were calling me when they kept saying, "Hey, Worf!" A third experience would be the time I was thrown into the hot tub with all of my clothes on. I didn't really know what was going on there.

Amit also plays on Marquette's club rugby team, and is a manager at the Brew Bayou (coffee shop in the Alumni Memorial Union). 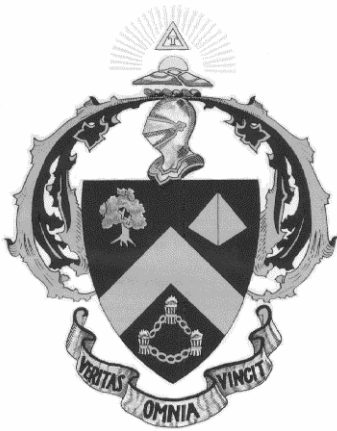

Member Development Program

When Brother Andy Anderson took office as Internal Vice President, one of his goals was to set up a structured development program for new members entering the Fraternity. So many times the chapter is in need of good leaders, but we forget to cultivate our younger members for those positions. Over the course of the fall semester Brother Anderson and David Fleishacker, Triangle National Educational Leadership Consultant, have devised a program to improve the personal skills of younger Triangle actives and prepare them for future leadership roles. At this time, the active chapter does not require the program, but we are encouraging as many members as possible to participate. The program is meant to be completed within two years, so those members who participate can be prepared for leadership roles during their junior and senior years.

The program consists of three component "tracks" and one final "track". The Fellowship track, Chivalry track, and the Structure track comprise the component tracks, and after a member has completed these, he may move on to the Triangle track.

There are certain requirements to complete each track; for example, to complete the Fellowship track, a member must complete the pledge program, work week, and the Ritual.

For a member to meet the requirements for the Chivalry track, they must be in attendance for a motivational seminar, financial responsibility seminar, study skills seminar, and a meal etiquette seminar. The member must also take a pledge son (by means of completing a paddle), be an active participant in the Ritual ceremony, and be actively involved in three philanthropic events.

The Structure track requirements include the completion of a conflict management workshop, resume writing seminar, time management seminar, team building seminar, and leadership training retreat or institute (UIFI, MGCA). Additionally, one must hold an elected or appointed office (Triangle or IFC), and have two semesters at or above a 3.0 GPA.

The final track, the Triangle track, involves attendance at a financial planning seminar, a recruitment seminar, and an interview skills seminar. The individual must also attend a session on how to run effective meetings and learn parliamentary procedure, hold an executive board position.

These tracks have been designed to develop the whole individual and give that member the very best skills to success in college as well as in life. Activities and seminar completions are reported to the Internal Vice President, who keeps an updated file on all members and the respective activities that they have completed.

In order to staff the different workshops and seminars, Brother Anderson is working with the National Office and various departments in the university to bring in speakers. Last semester National President Jeff Scott gave a presentation on conflict resolution, which was attended by a large number of actives. If there is a specific area in which you have expertise and you would like to spend an evening making a presentation, the active chapter encourages your participation.

Currently, there are a number of Brothers who are working toward completion of the various tracks. When the first member completes all four tracks, a recognition place will be placed in the chapter room with that individual's name; other individuals
