This year's efforts have been concentrated mostly on organizing a Milwaukee area Founder's Day and centennial celebration. The Marquette chapter had a great turnout and I would like to thank the alumni that attended. We will be going back to a Marquette exclusive Founder's Day next year, but might consider another Milwaukee wide event in 5 years for the 105th anniversary. Announcement

This year, the board has also discussed ways to fund some house improvements and updates. To this end, we recently withdrew the annuity and will use some for these updates, and reinvest a significant amount into an account with higher yield since the annuity has only awarded the minimum interest over the last couple years, 4.5%. Brother Santi worked for Briggs & Stratton for almost 50 years. His innovation and engineering skills made Briggs & Stratton's small

Throughout John's career he has excelled in improving small engine design efficiency. On more than one occasion John has developed solutions to major problems for Briggs & Stratton.

2007 TRIANGLE NATIONAL CONVENTION AWARDS

At the 68th National Convention held July 12-14, 2007, Triangle Fraternity honored brothers who have who have achieved pre-eminence in their support of Triangle, professional or civic fields.

The Active Chapter placed fourth in the 2005-2006 Chapter Performance Award. The Chapter also was recognized for Chapter Growth, initiating between 10 and 19 actives during the 2006-2007 school year.

For Triangle's highest honor, the **Triangle Service Key** awarded for pre-eminent work in developing the National Organization of Triangle in one or more elective or appointed national posts, the following Marquette brothers of 57 total winners were honored:

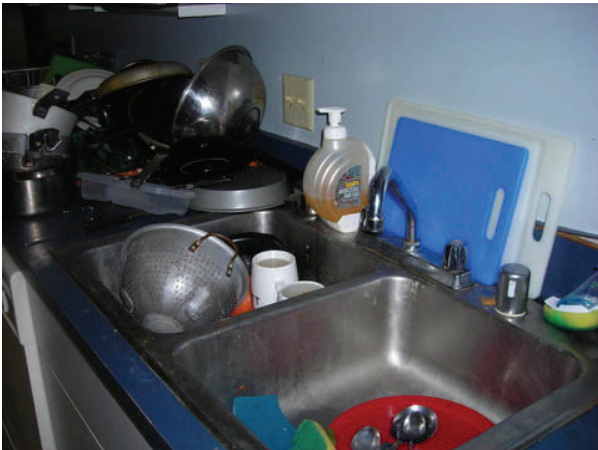
